Deadline for applications is April 28, 2021

NYSERDA is launching an ambitious effort to assess how climate change will affect New York's communities, ecosystems, and economy. The "New York State Climate Impacts Assessment:

Understanding and Preparing for Our Changing
Climate", will include updated climate projections, in-depth climate change impacts on New York
State, adaptation strategies, and case studies. It is anticipated that this assessment may inform climate choices at all levels of decision making in the state

To ensure that the process and resulting information reflect the current state of science and New York's unique concerns, NYSERDA is seeking involvement from engaged and knowledgeable people from across the state and its many colleges and universities, communities, peoples, and businesses. Interested individuals can apply to serve in a workgroup or on an advisors' panel. NYSERDA strongly encourages applicants who represent the diversity of New York State.

As a contractor to NYSERDA, Eastern Research Group (ERG) will be responsible for subcontracting with the experts and stakeholders to support the assessment, as well as communications and outreach services to develop and disseminate various end products.

ReLeaf Webinar Series: Climate Change and Community Forest Programs

May 6 at 12 p.m. – 1:15 p.m Join NYS ReLeaf's Hudson Valley committee for a webinar on Climate and Community Forest programs. This lunchtime webinar will introduce you to programs that can help your community get climate smart and prepare your community forest for the future.

Angelica Patterson (master science educator, Black Rock Forest and PhD candidate Columbia University) will talk about how plants are responding to warming climate and the factors driving climate-induced tree migrations, while Andy Hillman (arborist, urban forestry consultant, NYS Urban Forestry Council) will present a selection of trees from other regions evaluated for the northeast and the importance of considering hardy cultivars for future climates, and Dazzle Ekblad (Office of Climate Change, NYS DEC) will introduce the Climate Smart Communities program and how to get started with climate smart programs in your community.

Applicants are sought for three levels of responsibility within each TWG:

- TWG Chairs (or Co-Chairs)
- TWG Members
- Sector Advisors

It is anticipated that the assessment will be developed over a period of 18 to 24 months. Applicants must be willing and able to perform the duties of their position during the entire timeframe of the assessment. Depending on need and/or the level of participation, technical experts are offered compensation for their engagement.

Webinars on the Agriculture & Forestry CLCPA Recommendations

On April 13th ESFPA held the first of 3 webinars on the forestry recommendation of the Climate Action Council Agriculture & Forestry Advisory Panel. These webinars are being co-hosted by the Adirondack Landowners Association, the New York Forest Owners Association and the New York Society of American Foresters.

The purpose of these webinars is to present the





advisory panel recommendations as they were presented to the Climate Action Council. Commissioner Richard Ball (Ag. & Markets Commissioner) presented the full set of recommendations to the Climate Action Council April 12th along with the Agriculture recommendations of the Advisory Panel (see here).

The full CAC has to get presentations from 7 Advisory panels and then they need to select those that they want to bring forward. This is not going to happen to quickly, but they do have to have a draft Scoping Plan by December 31st.
